Praying for Johnstown

During this series, we will be exploring what it means to be a church that seeks the well-being of Johnstown through prayer, compassion, hospitality, and action. Each week, we will reflect on God's call to be a light in our community and to see our neighbors through Christ's eyes. As part of this journey, we will have a large map of downtown Johnstown available in worship. Throughout the month, members will be invited to place prayers, concerns, hopes, and blessings directly onto the map. Together, we will pray for neighborhoods, schools, businesses, community organizations, first responders, local leaders, and all who call Johnstown home. My hope is that this visual reminder will help us see our city not simply as a place where we live, but as a place where God is already at work and where we are called to join Him.



The Open Door: Almost Ready

One of the most exciting developments in the life of our church continues to be The Open Door: Johnstown Community Free Store. Over the past several months, volunteers have been planning, organizing, sorting donations, preparing spaces, building partnerships, and dreaming together about what this ministry can become. What began as an idea and a vision is quickly becoming a reality. At the time of this writing, we are very close to opening our doors. While there are still a few final details to complete, we are hopeful that The Open Door will be serving our community before the next newsletter arrives in September. This ministry is about much more than providing material goods. It is about hospitality, dignity, relationships, and reminding our neighbors that they are seen, valued, and loved by God. Thank you to everyone who has donated, volunteered, prayed, and encouraged this effort. We look forward to sharing more exciting news very soon.



Kingdom Living at Pine Springs Camp

One of the highlights of my summer will be spending two weeks at Pine Springs Church Camp alongside all three of my children. I will once again serve as a Volunteer Weekly Director, supporting counselors, encouraging staff, and helping create a safe and faith-filled environment for campers. This year's camp theme is "Kingdom Living." Throughout the summer, campers will explore what it means to live as citizens of God's Kingdom by focusing on prayer and the teachings of Jesus. I feel forgetful all the time. It seems almost daily I walk into a room and ask, "What did I come in here for?" I feel too young to be having memory issues. Should I be concerned?

Everyone has moments of forgetfulness. Typically, in these moments, it's because you're distracted rather than having a true memory problem. Misplacing items and forgetting why you walked into a room are examples of benign distractibility.

It's more concerning when there's a clear change in your memory or thinking abilities compared with the past that is impacting daily life. Often family or friends notice this change first. Examples of cognitive changes that may warrant additional evaluation include:

- Repeating questions.
- Not recalling recent events or conversations.
- Having difficulty keeping track of medications or upcoming tasks.
- Getting confused while paying bills.
- Getting lost or disoriented while driving.

Factors such as stress, lack of sleep or alcohol intake can impact memory. So can underlying health issues such as a thyroid imbalance. Your healthcare team will consider these factors when evaluating cognitive concerns. An initial step is to look over the medications you're taking, as certain ones-including some commonly used for allergies and incontinence - can affect memory and alertness.

Your healthcare team also can ensure that any treatable underlying conditions, such as depression, insomnia or sleep apnea, are addressed. Blood tests may be used to check for reversible causes of cognitive impairment, such as a thyroid condition, vitamin B-12 deficiency or liver disease. After these are ruled out, the next step is to determine whether an irreversible condition, including a neurodegenerative disease such as Alzheimer's disease, is causing the memory loss.

Your healthcare team might conduct brief cognitive screenings to help identify whether you may benefit from further testing. Age is the greatest risk factor for developing cognitive impairment, with symptoms most commonly seen in people age 70 and older. Prompt evaluation is especially recommended if there is rapid cognitive decline and loss of function at home.

Ultimately, the earlier memory loss is detected, the greater the opportunity there is to pursue therapies, such as medications or lifestyle changes, that may help slow the decline.

Making a Fearless Moral Inventory of Ourselves

After coming to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity in Step 2, we decided in Step 3 to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him.

For many of us, surrender did not come easily. Letting go of old ways of thinking and trusting a Higher Power takes faith, patience, and willingness. The Third Step Prayer has helped many of us begin this journey by reminding us that we do not have to face life's challenges alone.

THIRD STEP PRAYER

Dear God, I offer myself to You—to build with me and do with me as You will. Relieve me of the bondage of self so that I may better do Your will. Take away my difficulties, so that victory over them may show those I would help Your power, Your love, and Your way of life. May I do Your will always.

As we continue in recovery, we arrive at the Fourth Step: making a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves. This step supports spiritual growth and personal change. It asks us to look honestly at our fears, resentments, guilt, attitudes, and behaviors while also recognizing our strengths, virtues, and positive qualities.

A self-inventory takes courage and honesty. It is not meant to judge or condemn us, but to help us understand ourselves more clearly. Before we can fairly evaluate others, we must first look honestly at ourselves. By examining both our assets and our shortcomings, we gain a balanced and truthful view of our lives today.

Nar-Anon provides many resources to guide us through this process, including books, pamphlets, and the shared experience of other members. Meetings and conversations with those who have completed a fearless moral inventory can offer guidance, encouragement, and hope.

The rewards of completing an honest and fearless self-inventory are many. We come to understand ourselves more fully and identify patterns and behaviors that may interfere with our serenity and well-being. We also grow in appreciation for our strengths and become more aware of the areas where we need growth. Most importantly, we begin to see the person our Higher Power is helping us become.

Through faith, honesty, and willingness, the Fourth Step opens the door to healing, self-discovery, and spiritual growth. It helps us move forward in recovery with greater understanding, acceptance, and hope.

COOKIE SMILE POPS



Transform slice-and-bake cookies into cheerful lollipop treats and share a few edible smiles.


What you need:

- 1 roll refrigerated sugar cookie dough
- Knife
- Baking sheet
- Wooden craft sticks
- Frosting
- Sprinkles
- Clear treat bags
- Ribbon



What you do:

1. Freeze the cookie dough for 15 to 20 minutes to firm it up, then slice into ¼-inch rounds.
2. Place cookies on a baking sheet about 2 inches apart.
3. Bake at 350 degrees for 5 minutes.
4. Remove from the oven and gently press a wooden stick halfway into the bottom of each cookie.
5. Return to the oven and bake 3 to 5 more minutes, until lightly golden.
6. Let cookies cool completely.
7. Decorate with frosting to create smiling faces and add sprinkles.
8. Slip each cookie pop into a treat bag and tie with ribbon.

Presbyterians played a foundational role in the American Revolution, to the point where King George III and British loyalists frequently referred to the conflict as a "Presbyterian Rebellion". This was largely due to the Calvinist philosophy of the time, which held that "resistance to tyranny is obedience to God", combined with representative church governance that naturally aligned with democratic ideals. Twelve of the fifty-six signers of the Declaration of Independence were Presbyterian, including the only active clergyman to sign the document.

The Key Clergyman - Rev. John Witherspoon: A Scottish immigrant who served as president of the College of New Jersey (now Princeton University), he was the only active member of the clergy to sign the Declaration of Independence. He also helped draft the Articles of Confederation.

Presbyterian Signers of the Declaration of Independence - Twelve signers had direct roots in or were active members of Presbyterian congregations across the colonies:

Matthew Thornton (New Hampshire): Scottish-Irish immigrant and physician.

Philip Livingston (New York): Merchant and graduate of Yale University.

William Floyd (New York): Wealthy landowner and politician.

Benjamin Rush (Pennsylvania): A prominent Philadelphia physician and educator who attended the University of Edinburgh.

James Smith (Pennsylvania): Lawyer and iron manufacturer.

George Taylor (Pennsylvania): Industrialist who successfully ran an iron furnace.

James Wilson (Pennsylvania): Scottish immigrant and leading legal mind.

Abraham Clark (New Jersey): Surveyor and lawyer.

Richard Stockton (New Jersey): Prominent lawyer and judge.

John Hart (New Jersey): Farmer and justice of the peace.

John Witherspoon (New Jersey): (See detail in the Key Clergyman section above).

Thomas McKean (Delaware): Lawyer and future Chief Justice of Pennsylvania.

Other Notable Patriots, Statesmen, and Chaplains

George Duffield: Pastor of Philadelphia's Third Presbyterian Church who served as chaplain to the Continental Congress.

Charles Thomson: Secretary of the Continental Congress who attended College of Philadelphia (studied under Presbyterian minister Francis Alison) and read the Declaration aloud.

Elias Boudinot: Prominent statesman, commissary general of prisoners for the Continental Army, and president of the Continental Congress.

Rev. James Caldwell: Presbyterian minister and brigade chaplain in the Continental Army known as the "Fighting Parson," who notably passed out hymnbooks for wadding during the Battle of Springfield.

The Signers of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence (1775): A gathering of fiercely independent, largely Scots-Irish Presbyterians in Mecklenburg County, North Carolina, who drafted their own declaration of independence before the national one, led by Presbyterian laymen like John McKnitt Alexander.
